From Father Tim

In today's first reading from the prophet Joel, he tells us: "Even now, says the Lord, return to me with your whole heart with fasting, weeping and mourning..."

EVEN NOW – this Ash Wednesday – is a new beginning for all of us; another chance – or maybe the 500th chance for each of us. It does not matter. It's a time of new beginnings for all of us. Because the Lord is about 10,000 chances. Why? Because He loves all of us with an undivided heart, and the Lord wants all of us to be with Him in paradise....And it starts with all of us with ONE STEP.

With fasting – to deny ourselves – from things we enjoy for the sake of the kingdom – chocolate, TV – Instagram or Facebook. To deny ourselves for the Lord this Lenten season – and add a little more prayer; a little more spiritual reading and reflection, and some sacred silence – to listen to the voice of the Lord that is in our hearts – and to take a few steps closer to Christ this Lenten season. May we ask the Lord to open our hearts to love more, to be more compassionate and forgiving – and certainly to be more patient with ourselves and those around us; that we truly see all people as Christ!

WITH WEEPING. All tears come from God – all tears come from God! Tears show we love God and our neighbor, and we have true sorrow for our sins. Tears can also be signs of great joy in our lives. Living life to the fullest of our capabilities and living life in abundance, as we follow Christ with all of our hearts.

AND MOURNING. We mourn the loss of loved ones and those who are close to us. We mourn when a loved one is ill, and we reach out to those in need, or those who need a shoulder to cry on. Many here today remember exactly where we were when we first heard the about the events of September 11, 2001. We mourned as a nation, because the love of humankind is deeply imbedded in our souls, and we want to do our best to help those who are hurting or suffering. Because all of us are made for love. That's the beauty of being human as we unite our spirits with the spirit of Christ, who is LOVE Himself.

As we celebrate Ash Wednesday, and begin this Lenten season 2024, may we do what Paul tells us in his 2nd letter to the Corinthians – Be reconciled with God and with one another. Pray for the power to forgive, and to seek forgiveness. Love has no boundaries. Peace has no boundaries. Hope has no boundaries. We are people of faith, hope and love – and love is eternal, and we seek to love God, our neighbor and ourselves with all of our hearts!

And one more thing. BE HUMBLE. Be humble. That is the essence of today's gospel from Matthew in a nutshell. "Keep your deeds of mercy secret, and your Father will repay you..." "Pray to your Father in private – then your Father – who see what no man sees – will repay you." BE HUMBLE, because a contrite and humble spirit the Lord will not spurn; and humility opens the door to all avenues of love in our lives – and LOVE NEVER FAILS!

The greatest act of love in the history of the world was when Christ suffered and died on the Cross for all of us – because His love for us is far more powerful than we can ever imagine in this world. That is why we keep our vision on Christ every moment of our lives. The vision of love, peace, forgiveness and hope that will never disappoint, and that vision that will lead us to everlasting life. May all of us have a happy and holy Lent filled with the spirit of Christ. We ask this through Christ our Lord, Amen.

Come and Journey with a Savior

On Sunday afternoon, friends graciously invited my husband and me to their home to enjoy the Super Bowl. It proved to be a delightful afternoon filled with delicious food and happy conversations. As someone originally from Hong Kong and new to American culture, I found myself in awe of the spectacle surrounding this iconic event.

The sheer magnitude of the Super Bowl was striking, from the dazzling array of advertisements by major corporations, each seeking for the attention of viewers, to the electrifying atmosphere of the stadium, alive with the cheers of fans supporting their teams. Learning that Super Bowl 2024 was the most-watched telecast in U.S. history, with over 123 million viewers, only added to the sense of wonder.

What truly left me awestruck was the halftime show—a meticulously orchestrated production featuring a blend of visual and auditory extravagance. From the elaborate costumes of the performers to the intricately choreographed dance routines, it was a sensory feast that pushed the boundaries of creativity and entertainment to their utmost limits.

However, during Lent, the extravagant displays of the Super Bowl halftime show give way to the simplicity and solemnity of liturgical practices—prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. It is a time of preparation for the liturgical celebration of the suffering, Death, and Resurrection of Christ. It invites us to a season of introspection, reflection, and spiritual renewal. As the revelry of the Super Bowl fades into memory, Lent offers a reminder—a time for quiet contemplation and humble self-examination. It beckons us to journey inward, to confront our shortcomings, and to seek forgiveness and reconciliation with God.

The hymn was written by the Reverend Dr. Herbert O'Driscoll (1928–), originating in 1985. A native of Ireland, O'Driscoll's spiritual journey began after his graduation from Trinity College, Dublin, where he was ordained as a deacon and later as a priest in 1953. His life was marked by a commitment to faith and a responsive attitude to the contemporary needs of people.

In 1954, O'Driscoll immigrated to Canada, where he assumed the role of chaplain in the Royal Canadian Navy. Subsequently, he served as the rector of a parish in Ottawa. O'Driscoll's passion for preaching led him to higher positions, eventually becoming the Canon and Warden at the National College of Preachers and the National Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul in Washington, DC. His influence extended beyond traditional ecclesiastical boundaries, as he authored over forty books, composed more than forty hymns, and engaged audiences through radio broadcasts.

The hymn extends an invitation to embark on a spiritual journey with Christ, acknowledging His presence in our lives from the moment of our birth. Its six verses serve as a roadmap for inner exploration, outward service to others, and the collective endeavor to build the kingdom of Christ. The refrain challenges us to embrace our divine identity as children of God and to walk in solidarity with one another, empowered by the Holy Spirit.

Let us respond to this summons and embark on this sacred journey with our Savior.

FREE WILL OFFERING AT SOUP & BREAD

Each year we designate an agency that we will donate to. This year we have designated Good Samaritan's "Street Outreach" program. Currently it is overseen by Mark Nay.

A 100% of the donations will go directly to this Ministry.

In 2020 Good Samaritan received a grant from Rocky Mountain Development Council to implement and direct a new grant program, Street Outreach. At that time Mark Nay was hired who was in recovery himself and had experienced homelessness and shared life experiences with many of the people they reach out to on the streets.

The Street Outreach Program is largely based in the community, requiring Mark to walk the streets, act upon calls reporting individuals that appear to be homeless, send messages through the homeless community that we at Good Samaritan are there to help without judgement. Mark's regular stops include developing relationships with the homeless to gain trust for future individual needs or making referrals to our other programs.

Most often he finds that many of those he meets on the street are living with severe mental or physical illness, or struggling with addiction. His first meeting with someone may be to provide: Blanket, tents, sleeping bags, food, or to provide transportation for emergency medical treatment. Working to find a safe shelter, identifying a substance abuse program, (if there is an immediate need or the client might be ready to address their addiction issue) Emergency shelter, clothing vouchers, propane to help keep them warm on the street and other services as needed.

Living a Laudato Si' Lent - The World can Change a lot in 40 Days

February

- 14 Ash Wednesday Remember you are dust---star dust—made of the same stuff as all of creation!
- 15 Plan to read Laudato Si' for Lent---you only need to read 5 numbered sections a day! If you have read that, read Laudate Deum, Pope Francis' most recent apostolic exhortation. Find it at: https://carmelites.org.au/laudatedeum/ or on SMCC Care for Creation website.
- 16 Get a potted plant that you will especially care for during Lent and make a commitment to respect and care for all of creation.
- 17 Pray for refugees forced from their homes through climate change. Think of those at our southern border.
- "We have only one heart, and the same wretchedness which leads us to mistreat an animal will not be long in showing itself in our relationship with other people." (LS 92)
- **18 First Sunday of Lent** *Embrace the Silence Sunday*—Turn off iPhone, TV, radio, computer. Spend time outside listening to the sounds of creation.
- 19 Pray for those most affected by climate change—those living in poverty.
- 20 Try this week not to use a single disposable plastic product.
- 21 Plan to host a simple soup and bread supper with your friends and watch an ecological video together. "The Letter" is a wonderful choice: theletterfilm.org
- 22 Spend some time with an animal. How is it prayer for you?
- 23 Abstain today from a spirit of defeatism that despairs of facing climate change.
- 24 Clean your dryer's lint filter after each use and use dryer balls—this can reduce its energy use significantly.
- "Christian spirituality...encourages a prophetic and contemplative lifestyle, one capable of deep enjoyment free of the obsession with consumption" (LS 222)
- **25 Second Sunday of Lent** Practice deep enjoyment—savor slowly a piece of fine chocolate, a glass of wine, a deep breath.
- 26 Pray for those most affected by climate change---animal species who lose their habitat.
- 27 Light a candle and reflect on the words of a martyr of the Amazon, Sr. Dorothy Stang, SNDdeN, "I "I light a candle and look at Jesus on the cross and ask for the strength to carry the suffering of the people, the suffering of Earth."
- 28 Have you ever mentioned an ecological sin in confession? Think about it...- ecological examen.org
- 29 Resolve not to buy anything new in March, except essentials like food.

Mired in Disinformation! What's Person To Do?

Many people dread the upcoming months of television ads and talking heads, the evening news, social media and mailboxes stuffed with campaign ads, either projecting glossy images of a candidate or railing against an opponent. *There is no doubt, it is exhausting, and frankly, depressing.*

As normal human beings we tend to listen to and cling to our assumptions and biases that align with our needs, feelings and preconceived ideas. While truly understandable from a human standpoint, as adult Catholics participating in a civil society, are we called to a higher engagement with what we see, hear and read? We know that facts can be tweaked, statistical interpretations slanted, misleading photos used and artificial intelligence employed to make something that is inaccurate appear to be truthful.

We might be tempted to ask ourselves if it really matters, if it is not just "out of our hands" anyway, and whether or not we really have a Christian duty to vet what we see, hear, read and watch. The answer to that question lies in the conscience of each of us as individuals. But it's a serious question and one that begs an honest look.

<u>There is much on the line:</u> a polarized and progressively angry populace, a country with a democracy, fragile and stressed, struggles with immigration, climate change bringing wild, often destructive weather, pandemic jitters and crises in far flung lands that, in this global world, impact us all. *What's a person to do?*

We can believe that we are not powerless confronting the issues, that we have agency both in discovering what is real and honesty in confronting our own biases. Here are suggestions:*

- Be skeptical of headlines. Be skeptical of sound bites. Ask yourself why something might be misinformation.
- Ask what the source is; don't always trust "verified."
- Know and be willing to acknowledge the slant of various news programs.
- Slow down, watching and reading.
- Look at other reports and seek out additional context about news events.
- Be willing to challenge your own beliefs (this is hard!)
- Learn how artificial intelligence is used to alter or create pictures and create false narratives that sound like the real person.
- Use some reputable "fact checking" sources. When using these, it's important to cross-reference information and consider multiple reputable sources (Examples below)
- 1. **Snopes** (www.snopes.com): Snopes has investigated a wide range of claims, from urban legends to political statements since 1994.
- 2. **PolitiFact** (www.politifact.com): Run by the journalistic think tank Poynter Institute and focused on fact-checking political statements and claims.
- 3. FactCheck.org (www.factcheck.org): A project of the Annenberg Public Policy Center.
- 4. The Washington Post Fact Checker (www.washingtonpost.com/news/factchecker): Uses a "Pinocchio" rating system from one to four.

As followers of Jesus we are called to seek justice, truth and the common good. To the extent that we confront our own biases and challenge untruths in the media, we become part of the force to create a just and stable society for everyone.

May we pray to have the strength, courage, wisdom and guidance to walk this path with the Lord. AMEN
