From Father Tim

The Spiritual Offering of Trayer

From the treatise On Prayer by Tertullian, priest: Cap. 28-29: CCL 1, 273-274). Thursday in the Third Week of Lent, Office of Readings from The Liturgy of the Hours, according to the Roman Rite, II Lenten Season & Easter Season, English Translation Prepared by the International Commission on English in the Liturgy, Catholic Book Publishing Corp., New York, 1976.

"Prayer is the offering in spirit that has done away with the sacrifices of old. What good do I receive from the multiplicity of your sacrifices? asks God. I have had enough of burnt offerings of rams, and I do not want the fat of lambs and the blood of bulls and goats. Who has asked for these from your hands?

What God has asked for we learn from the Gospel. The hour will come, he says, when true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and in truth. God is a spirit, and so he looks for worshipers who are like himself.

We are true worshipers and true priests. We pray in spirit, and so offer in spirit the sacrifice of prayer. Prayer is an offering that belongs to God and is acceptable to him: it is the offering he has asked for, the offering he planned as his own.

We must dedicate this offering with our whole heart, we must fatten it on faith, tend it by truth, keep it unblemished through innocence and clean through chastity, and crown it with love. We must escort it to the altar of God in a procession of good works to the sound of psalms and hymns. Then it will gain for us all that we ask of God.

Since God asks for prayer offered in spirit and in truth, how can he deny anything to this king of prayer? How great is the evidence of its power, as we read and hear and believe.

Of old, prayer was able to rescue from fire and beasts and hunger, even before it received its perfection from Christ. How much greater then is the power of Christian prayer. No longer does prayer bring an angel or comfort to the heart of a fiery furnace, or close up the mouths of lions, or transport to the hungry food from the fields. No longer does it remove all sense of pain by the grace it wins for others. But it gives the armor of patience to those who suffer, who feel pain, who are distressed. It strengthens the power of grace, so that faith may know what it is gaining from the Lord, and understand what it is suffering from the name of God.

In the past prayer was able to bring down punishment, rout armies, withhold the blessing of rain. Now, however, the prayer of the just turns aside the whole anger of God, keeps vigil for its enemies, pleads for persecutors. Is it any wonder that it can call down water from heaven when it could obtain fire from heaven as well? Prayer is the one thing that can conquer God. But Christ gas willed that it should work no evil, and has given it all power over good.

Its only art is to call back the souls of the dead from the very journey into death, to give strength to the weak, to heal the sick, to exorcise the possessed, to open prison cells, to free the innocent from their chains. Prayer cleanses from sin, drives away temptations, stamps out persecutions, comforts the fainthearted, gives new strength to the courageous, brings travelers safely home, calms the waves, confounds robbers, feeds the poor, overrules the rich, lifts up the fallen, supports those who are falling, sustains those who stand firm.

All the angels pray. Every creature prays. Cattle and wild beasts pray and bend the knee. As they come from their barns and caves they look up to heaven and call out, lifting up their spirit in their own fashion. The birds too rise and lift themselves up to heaven: they open out their wings, instead of hands, in the form of a cross, and give voice to what seems to be a prayer.

What more need to be said on the duty of prayer? Even the Lord himself prayed. To him be honor and power for ever and ever. Amen."

WHAT IS CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD?

CGS is a Montessori-based Catholic faith formation program where children can grow in their relationship with God through a deep engagement in Scripture and liturgy. CGS is based on the belief that God and the child are already in relationship. Our work as adults is to provide a place for the child and God to come together and grow.

HISTORY

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is a Montessori-based religious formation program for children, beginning at the age of three. It seeks to create and facilitate a sacred, "hands-on" space for children called an atrium, in which both the children and their catechists can hear, ponder, and celebrate the most essential mysteries of the Catholic faith as revealed in the Scriptures and the Liturgy. Originally developed in Rome by Sofia Cavalletti and Gianna Gobbi fifty years ago, the Catechesis continues to spread world-wide.

CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD (CGS) AT ST. MARY CATHOLIC COMMUNITY

We applied for a grant from Catholic Extension in order to start CGS at St. Mary. The grant will be up to \$15,000. Part of the requirement of the grant is that there will be a meeting with a representative from Catholic Extension on Wednesday, April 3rd at 6pm in the Social Center. Catholic Extension wants to hear from parishioners of all ages and see how much support the parish will give this catechesis.

In CGS, the children meet in the atrium, which is a specially prepared room where children can come to know Jesus, the Good Shepherd. The atrium is prepared with materials that children work with as a way of meditating upon the essentials of our faith found in Scripture and in liturgy. We will need help with making materials for the atrium!

Jerusalem, My Destiny

Giovanni Battista Pergolesi (1710-1736) composed Stabat Mater, a profoundly moving exploration of the Virgin Mary's grief at the foot of the cross. Composed in the final years of his tragically short life, Pergolesi's work invites listeners into a contemplative journey, as they immerse themselves in the emotional depths of Mary's experience.

In Stabat Mater, the image of the Virgin Mary fixing her eyes on Jesus on the Cross becomes vivid and compelling. In this moment of intimacy between mother and son, listeners are encouraged to pause, reflect, and pray. The music transforms the listeners as they enter into Mary's sorrow and devotion, and to unite their own personal suffering with hers.

Each movement of the Stabat Mater offers a different facet of Mary's emotional journey. From the lament of the opening movement to the fervent affirmation of the closing Amen, Pergolesi captures the essence of Mary's faith and sorrow. Through soaring melodies, harmonies, and text painting, he leads listeners on a journey of the soul, inviting them to contemplate the mysteries of redemption and grace.

Amidst the Lenten season, Rory Cooney's Jerusalem, My Destiny serves as a companion to Pergolesi's Stabat Mater, echoing its themes of journey and redemption. As we sing this meditative song in Mass, we are reminded of our journey of faith, as we walk alongside Jesus toward Jerusalem. Just as Mary fixed her eyes on Jesus on the cross, so too are we called to fix our gaze on Jesus, embracing our own destiny with unwavering trust in God's redemption. As we fix our eyes on Jesus on the cross, we find in Cooney's music a source of renewal and hope, reminding us of the promise of new life found in Christ's resurrection.

As we sing and contemplate Jerusalem, My Destiny, may our hearts be filled with renewed faith and joy on our journey toward Jerusalem, our ultimate destiny in Christ.

HOLY WEEK

Holy Week is the most significant week in Catholicism. **Spanning from Palm Sunday to Holy Saturday**, it marks the final stretch before Easter Sunday, the celebration of Jesus' Resurrection.

We recognize four special days that lead up to Easter. The events of Christ's Passion from His entrance into Jerusalem, when palm branches were placed in His path, through His arrest on Holy Thursday and Crucifixion on Good Friday, to Holy Saturday, the day that Christ's body lay in the tomb. The summit of the Liturgical Year is the Easter Triduum—from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday. Though chronologically three days, they are liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery.

The single celebration of the Triduum marks the end of the Lenten season, and leads to the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord at the Easter Vigil. The liturgical services that take place during the Triduum are:

- * Mass of the Lord's Supper: 7:00 p.m.
- * Good Friday of the Lord's Passion: Stations of the Cross 12.10 p.m.

- 19 Take a few moments to breathe deeply and become aware of the communion of air shared by all breathing things.
- 20 Feast of St. Joseph "Joseph too can teach us how to show care; he can inspire us to work with generosity and tenderness in protecting this world which God has entrusted to us." (LS 242)
- 21 World Poetry Day Read a nature poet Mary Oliver, Wendell Berry, Emily Dickinson
- 22 World Water Day Drink a glass of water with reverence as you recall the waters of your birth and baptism.
- 23 Check your tire pressure. Low pressure tires use more gas per mile.
- "Eternal Life will be a shared experience of awe, in which each creature, resplendently transfigured, will take its rightful place and have something to give to those poor men and women who will have been liberated once and for all." (LS 243)
- 24 Palm Sunday Plan your menu for Holy Week. Choose as many meatless meals as you can; eat as many organic, locally produced foods as possible.
- 25 Feast of the Annunciation "In Mary's glorified body, part of creation has reached the fullness of its beauty hence we can ask her to enable us to look at this world with eyes of wisdom." (LS241)
- 26 Talk to a friend or family member about what it has meant to you to live Lent with Laudato Si'.
- 27 Spy Wednesday Reflect on how we humans have betrayed our fellow creatures by our selfish consumption. *Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Repair, Rot, and Recycle*
- 28 Holy Thursday Be conscious as you eat today that every meal is a holy communion.
- 29 Good Friday "Jesus entered into the created cosmos, throwing in his lot with it, even to the cross." (LS 99)
- 30 Holy Saturday Light a candle and renew your commitment to the vision of Laudato Si'. Reflect on all you have achieved during Lent and what you will carry forward on your journey to a sustainable life.

Palm Sunday - A Meditation

As Palm Sunday approaches and is suddenly upon us, with the anticipation of Lent being in the rearview mirror, we can envision Jesus astride a donkey, a "beast of burden," on a dusty road, people thronging around. Who are the players in that scene? And where are we in that picture?

Are we among the enthusiastic but deeply fickle bystanders, wildly waving palm fronds? Are we standing near the rear, mildly pleased but slightly skeptical? Are we among the onlookers from a distance wondering about the ruckus? Each of these stances presents a challenge: The wildly enthusiastic turn against Jesus in just a few short days. Are we like them, like the seed that falls on rocky ground, sprouts joyfully and then withers? What about the mildly pleased but skeptical ones? Perhaps they are like seeds that fell on more fertile ground. But as we know, even fertile ground needs tending. Our commitment to Jesus also needs tending. What about the seeds, choked out by the weeds? Are we like those onlookers who take in the "ruckus" but soon turn to worldly worries and pursuits?

Lastly, what about other players? As we know, *St. Francis taught that all God's creatures were of value, have a place.* What about the donkey? Can we learn from him? Are there lessons we can take forward in our own lives?

The Poet Thinks About the Donkey*

On the outskirts of Jerusalem
the donkey waited.
Not especially brave, or filled with understanding,
he stood and waited.

How horses, turned out into the meadow,
leap with delight!
How doves, released from their cages,
clatter away, splashed with sunlight!

But the donkey, tied to a tree as usual, waited.

Then he let himself be led away. Then he let the stranger mount.

Never had he seen such crowds!

And I wonder if he at all imagined what was to happen.

Still, he was what he had always been: small, dark, obedient.

I hope, finally, he felt brave.

I hope, finally, he loved the man who rode so lightly upon him, as he lifted one dusty hoof and stepped, as he had to, forward.

Boiler Update

I want to provide you with an update on our boiler project so many of you were generous to support – thank you!

The work on replacing the boiler started later than initially planned last summer because the plumbing contractor, Montana City Plumbing & Heating, had to finish another job.

The boilers were installed in October, but not connected to the base-hot-water heat system in the parish office. The explanation given was that the plumbing contractor did not want to dismantle the old system until the new system was fully installed and all kinks worked out of the new system. They were concerned that if there was a kink in the new system, the parish office could be left without heat for several days or weeks, during the cold winter months. So, the old system clanked its way through our coldest winter months.

Parish staff have reached out many, many times to Montana City Heating & Plumbing to once again get work started to finish this project. To date, there has been no response from Montana City Plumbing. The Diocese has been contacted for help in trying to get a response from Montana City Plumbing.

Sub-contractors, such as electricians and others, cannot do their work until such time as Montana City calls them in to do their portion of the work. As that hasn't happened yet, our electrician can't officially begin the work that needs to be done to parish thermostats in order to help complete the project. Please do not place any blame for the stall in this project on our electrician. It is not his fault.

We will continue to work diligently towards getting a response out of Montana City Plumbing and Heating. If a satisfactory response from them is not received in the near future, we will move toward a different solution in resolving our heating system for the parish office. 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
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
