# From Father Tim

In the gospel from John from Sunday, May 11, Jesus said: "My sheep hear my voice I know them, and they follow me..." Robert Prevost has heard the voice of the Lord from an early age; and following that voice has led him to become the 267th successor of Peter– Leo the XIV<sup>th</sup>. He is the first United States citizen to become a Pope, for which all of us are very proud. And because of his many years of missionary work in Peru, the now Pope Leo XIV has dual citizenship in Peru.

Born in Chicago September 14,1955, to his parents Louis Prevost and Mildred Martinez, Robert spent his childhood and early adolescence with his family. He has two brothers, Louis and John. More on them later...

Robert Prevost joined the Minor Seminary of the Augustinian Fathers, then studied at Villanova University, earning a degree in mathematics in 1977. In September 1977, Robert Prevost entered the novitiate of the Order of Saint Augustine, in the Province of Our Lady of Good Counsel of Chicago. He made his first profession September 2, 1978 and proclaimed his solemn vows on August 29, 1981.

Robert Prevost studied theology at the Catholic Theological Union in Chicago, and later studied Canon Law at the Pontifical University of Saint Thomas Aquinas, better known as the Angelicum.

After being ordained an Augustinian priest on June 18, 1982, Robert Prevost began a career in ministry which had many hats—missionary work and leadership roles in Peru as well as missions director in Illinois. He received his licentiate in 1984, and in 1987, defended his doctoral thesis on "The Role of the Local Prior in the Order of Saint Augustine."

In eleven years in Peru, Robert Prevost served as Prior, formation director, instructor for Professed, Judicial vicar, and professor of Canon Law, Patristics and Moral Theology— and pastor of two parishes. Robert Prevost returned to the United States in 1999 as he was elected Provincial Prior of the Augustinian Province of "Mother of Good Counsel" in Chicago, and later elected Prior General. Prevost continued to hold substantial roles within the Augustinian order when Pope Francis named him Apostolic Administrator of the Peruvian Diocese of Chiclayo, and soon after was ordained Bishop of Sufar on the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, December 12, 2014.

As Bishop of Sufar and later Chiclayo, Bishop Prevost was a member of the Peruvian Episcopal Conference, a member of the Congregation for the Clergy, and a member of the Congregation of Bishops—positions appointed to him by Pope Francis.

On January 30th, 2023, the Pope named Bishop Prevost as Prefect to the Dicastery for Bishops; President of the Pontifical Commission for Latin America, and also appointed him Archbishop. Pope Francis created Archbishop Prevost Cardinal in the Consistory on September 30th, 2024, where Cardinal Prevost was assigned the Diaconate of Saint Monica. As head of the Dicastery, Cardinal Prevost was involved in the Pope's most recent Apostolic journeys, and was involved in the Synod of Bishops on synodality in 2023 and 2024.

Pope Francis continued to appoint Cardinal Prevost as a member of several Dicasteries including Evangelization, Doctrine of the Faith, Clergy, and Culture and Education. On February 6th, the Pope appointed Cardinal Prevost to the Order of Bishops, and three days later Cardinal Prevost celebrated the Mass presided over by Pope Francis in St. Peter's Square for the Jubilee of the Armed Forces, the second major event of the Holy Year of Hope.

All of these past moments led to the powerful moment we experienced on Thursday, May 8<sup>th</sup>; as the College of Cardinals elected Cardinal Prevost as the 267th successor of Peter, the native of Chicago and a White Sox fan—which shows the power of our new Holy Father's faith. Pope Leo XIV always aspired to be a priest. His brothers knew it. His neighbors knew Robert Prevost was special; a young man who loved the Lord with all of his heart. The boys would play war in the back yard. Robert Prevost's brothers wanted to be military leaders in these games, like a captain or general. Robert always wanted to be the priest on the battlefield, for which the brothers would say, "what do you want to be, the Pope?"

In a post-conclave press conference, the American Cardinals were gathered with the press for about an hour. Cardinal Tobin of New Jersey stated that there was 'noise' that Cardinal Prevost was going to be the one chosen. Tobin cast his vote, was walking back to his seat, looked over at Cardinal Prevost, and saw him with his face in his hands in deep prayer. Cardinal Tobin stated that when Cardinal Prevost said yes to his brother Cardinals in becoming the 267th successor of Peter, a weight came off of Prevost's shoulders, and it was simply meant for him. "That God had made something clear, and he agreed with it."

Our new Holy Father Pope Leo XIV is a tennis player, speaks several languages, and his brothers will still call him Bob. Pope Leo's brothers, by the way, are not totally surprised by their other brother's new position because they always knew there was something very special about him, and how Robert Prevost followed the Lord with all of his heart.

This Easter season, we give thanks for so many things in our lives. And we thank God for the gift of our new Holy Father, Pope Leo XIV. May the Lord bless him and protect him. May his face shine upon him and be gracious to him, as Pope Leo XIV<sup>th</sup> takes on the role as the Vicar of Christ on earth— and the moral voice for all of humanity! Praised be Jesus Christ, risen from the dead, now and forever!





# **Pastoral Care**

In the Gospel reading for the Fifth Sunday of Easter, we encounter the mystery of Judas's betrayal—and Jesus's astonishing response:

"Now is the Son of Man glorified, and God is glorified in Him."

Judas's betrayal of Jesus is awful. Forgiveness is hard.

It is a firm choice of the will, and it is a process that can take a lifetime.

Jesus tells us to forgive not just seven times, but seventy times seven.

Sometimes, I think He simply wants us to keep trying.

We can't just slap a spiritual Band-Aid on deep wounds.

With God's grace, perhaps some saints can sing hymns and pray their enemies forgiven as they're being led to the lions.

But more often, forgiveness is a long, stumbling journey—a groping about in the dark.

We must depend on Our Lord to come close and help us take the next step. And in that process, our emotions must be honored and felt:

- Anger at the injustice
- Sadness that the relationship isn't what it should be
- And eventually, acceptance

Sometimes this process also reveals the need for healthy boundaries—which are not the opposite of love, but often the fruit of it. Even when we've been deeply hurt, we can still hope the best for the other person.

Holocaust survivor Viktor Frankl wrote:

"Each of us has his own inner concentration camp. We must deal... with forgiveness."

And in Food for the Soul, Peter Kreeft says:

"Jesus is not such a stupid psychologist as to say to us: I command you to have sweet, nice, happy feelings toward each other. This love is a choice of the will, a resolve, a commitment, a promise. Feelings can't be promised. But promises can be kept... This love frees us from misery because it frees us from our selfishness, our addiction to ourselves... That's why this love makes us happy: it's self-forgetful."

In the end, forgiveness requires agape love—a self-gift that is not deserved.

(And that includes me!)

# Lord, When Did We See You Homeless?

Corporal Works of Mercy based on Mt 25: 34-45
"The Cry of the Poor" (Laudato Si Action Plan, Theme 2)

As Catholics we know we are gifted and saved collectively. We are called by our triune God to love, pray for, have compassion and care for, and advocate for all of our neighbors especially the most vulnerable among us.



**Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta** is an inspirational model of service based on loving, faith-filled ministry to people experiencing extreme poverty whom she saw as her brothers and sisters. She treated each person with dignity as she respectfully and compassionately cared for their physical, emotional and spiritual needs. *She led a Jesus-centered life!* **She embodied the Catholic Social Teaching themes of solidarity and a preferential option for the poor.** 

Solidarity is based in part on knowing about the people we are serving. When we seek to assist others, we often experience receiving as much or more than we give. In a recent presentation sponsored by the Parish Diversity Celebration, the film "Why Should We Care," featuring interviews with unhoused people who call Helena home, was presented by Valerie Hellerman of Hands On Global. The presentation included a powerful display of photographs of unhoused people entitled "Faces in Helena."

Many of the people filmed or photographed have long standing connections to the Helena area. One of them graduated from one of our state universities. Most of them have an employment history. Some rely on their faith in God to get them through. *Often, they help each other out.* None of them can afford housing. As we learned more about people who are unhoused, we compassionately discovered how much we have in common. We are all part of one human family. We all have hopes and dreams, failures and regrets, strengths and weaknesses. We all want to be loved and included, forgiven and understood, seen and respected, treated with kindness and dignity. We all need help sometimes.

A flyer entitled "Homeless in Helena – A Snapshot" from United Way details information on homelessness in Helena, services designed to prevent it and organizations offering assistance to our unsheltered neighbors. Copies are available in the gathering space. Factors contributing to the increase in the number of unhoused people, including children and seniors, are income inequality, the increasing cost of rent, mental health issues, a history of trauma and substance abuse.

At the end of the presentation everyone was very energized! People had many questions and ideas for ways to help! These include: greeting people we see on the streets and treating them respectfully; assembling bags to give to people asking for money (that include food, information on services, a prayer, a space blanket for warmth, money, etc.); purchasing and donating parkas that convert to sleeping bags; donating to agencies serving people experiencing homelessness; and helping people get ID's. The Saint Francis Peace Through Justice Ministry plans to implement some of these ideas.

Make us worthy, Lord, to serve our fellow man throughout the world who live and die in poverty and hunger. Give them through our hands, their daily bread and, by our understanding love, give peace and joy. AMEN

# SAINT MARY CARE FOR CREATION MINISTRY

This Sunday, May 18<sup>th</sup>, SMCC will be commemorating the tenth anniversary of Pope Francis's profound encyclical, *Laudato Si' – On Care for Our Common Home*. The Saint Mary Care for Creation Ministry asked Dr. Wendy Yuen to select a song for this celebration. She chose "**Let Us Sing as We Go,**" composed by the talented Jaime Cortez. Dr. Yuen wrote the following, "This song finds its roots in the profound themes articulated in Pope Francis's encyclical, which underscores the imperative of global environmental stewardship."

Dr. Yuen continues, "Released in 2015, 'Laudato Si' emphasizes the intrinsic connection between humanity and the environment, drawing upon both scientific insights and religious teachings to advocate for the preservation of our planet for future generations.

The encyclical calls upon individuals, communities, and governments to **embrace sustainable practices**, **advocate for social justice**, and **cultivate a profound sense of ecological responsibility.** 

Cortez's composition brilliantly encapsulates these themes. In Verse 1, we are invited to rejoice in the gift of life itself, as Cortez underscores the transformative power of music to convey deep emotions and foster unity. This celebration of love transcends boundaries, resonating universally and inspiring us to live with purpose and compassion.

Verse 2 shifts the focus to themes of reconciliation and environmental stewardship, echoing Pope Francis' call for a renewed commitment to harmony with the Earth. Cortez urges listeners to embrace a holistic approach to stewardship, guided by principles of love and interconnectedness, thus paving the way for a more sustainable and compassionate future.

Verse 3 delves deeper into the themes of stewardship, peace, and justice, emphasizing humanity's divine mandate to care for and protect the world. Cortez's lyrics echo the encyclical's plea for a response characterized by humility, solidarity, and adherence to the teachings of Christ, thus fostering a sense of responsibility towards our common home.

The refrain serves as a poignant reminder of our shared duty to care for the Earth, emphasizing that it is not merely a place of habitation but a shared space belonging to all. Cortez's enchanting melody, coupled with the profound message of the song, Invigorates the spirit and ignites a sense of collective purpose.

As we unite in song and journey together, let us embrace our role as stewards of God's creation, working diligently towards a future where all life can thrive harmoniously"





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
