Prayer part 4

The Our Father part 2

The previous section focused on the first 2 words of the Our Father. This part will continue into the next part of the prayer “who art in Heaven, hallowed be thy name.” The word “father” emphasizes relationship. God is more to us than an infinite being who is beyond time and knows everything. He chooses to relate to us in human terms as a father taking us as his children. This first part of the Our Father now becomes a pattern for us for all prayer. When we pray, we should always choose a way of addressing God.

Yet, the Our Father teaches us that there is more to praying than simply addressing God. The next step is to remind ourselves about the nature of God. Who is this god that we are praying to? What qualities are important to us? The Our Father teaches us that prayer should address God in one or more of his qualities to clarify who and why we are praying. In the Our Father we address God as the “one who is in heaven.”

God is the king of Heaven, the ruler of the Heaven, the reason why heaven exists. Jesus gave us this quality of God to make an emphasis for us. We seek the God who is in Heaven and with whom we hope to live in Heaven. This address gives our prayers, our lives, and our understanding of God a directionality.

We are not just praying to any god we choose but a God whom will open the gates of Heaven for us.

We can expand this line of thinking into all of our prayer. O God who is healer of the sick. O God who came to be with us. O Jesus, who died and rose for us. God has many qualities. The more we know about God, the more we can tailor our prayers to reflect the aspect of God we want to emphasize by our prayers.

Additionally, the art of crafting a prayer also is a way to come to know God better.

Some of the words of the Our Father are strange to us: thy and art. We used to use these words to express familiarity, friendship or closeness. The 2nd person informal was meant to encompass the way we talk to people who are closest to us. Therefore, this translation of the Our Father reflects that we are speaking to

God as though he is a friend, a close friend, someone we trust and care about.

“Thy will be done.” The Our Father is a prayer of trust. In the first few lines we move quickly from addressing God to our first of seven petitions. We actually pray that God’s will is done both now and in the future, both on earth and in heaven, both in the grand scheme of creation and in our lives. If God is all powerful and worthy of our trust and admiration, we should also trust that his will is good even when we are unsure. This part of the prayer invites us to reflect on God’s will, our willingness to obey it, and our belief in the goodness of God. The line hinges the prayer between reflecting on the nature of God and requesting something of him. How often do we seek God’s will? How often are we willing to allow God’s will to be done? How willing are we to surrender to his will?

Pope’s Intentions for September 2026

For the care of water

Let us pray for a just and sustainable management of water, a vital resource, so that everyone may have equal access to it.

Liturgy Updates

Often people who have loved ones who are sick will bring a pyx (a gold container that holds the Eucharist for transport) to Mass and ask to bring communion to the sick. This practice is good and laudable. We should be encouraging the care of the sick and helping them on the road to recovery. Most of the people whom I have met bring their pyx when they receive Communion. This practice causes a number of challenges for me as the pastor. Often, I don't know who these people are and to whom they are bringing Communion. I would like to know whom they are bringing Communion to in case the sick person needs a visit or I need to connect with them. Additionally, some people today are trying to steal the Eucharist for nefarious purposes (and yes, it has happened in our church). I need to do what I can to prevent this from happening. For those of you who are bringing Communion to the sick, I ask you to see me after Mass and I will happily get Communion for you.

Starting in mid-September, I am going to start something new. Instead of people coming up to me after Mass, I want to bring up those people who are bringing Communion to the sick at the end of the Communion and send them to care for the sick. By bringing those people up after Communion, we are making a point that the sick are still in Communion with us, they are still part of our Community. As part of this change, I am going to have a Eucharistic Minister and an altar server or other helper, bring the Blessed Sacrament from the Tabernacle in the Adoration Chapel to the altar. Bringing the Blessed Sacrament to the altar at this point in the Mass helps make some strong connections to what we do. First, it is a strong reminder that we reserve the Blessed Sacrament for the sick. Since the 1st century, the Church has always reserved the Eucharist for those who cannot make it to Mass due to sickness. Second, it emphasizes the importance of Jesus' presence in the Blessed Sacrament. We will no longer take him back to the sacristy after communion but bring him to the Adoration Chapel for those who want to spend time in prayer with the Body and Blood of Jesus. Third, it allows us to properly care for Jesus' Body which should be treated with reverence. Fourth, it allows me to bring back the purification of the vessels at the end of Communion. The purification of the vessels is a rite during the Mass in which the priest or deacon uses water to soak up any remaining particles of Jesus' Body and Blood and consume them. Why is this important? For two reasons. First, it reminds us that the Body and Blood of Jesus is meant to be consumed. We shouldn't wash him down the drain or clean him up with rags. Jesus wants us to consume him and that is the best way to treat his body with reverence. Second, it completes the structure of the Mass. We start the Mass with nothing on the altar and we end the Mass with nothing on the altar. Everything is brought in and everything is consumed. It's like a dinner party in which we helped cook, set the table, and clean up. We are present for every part of this feast. If you have questions or concerns about these changes, please let me know.

The requirements for this job are a high school diploma or equivalent, some experience in youth ministry or pastoral care, and a practicing Catholic. As prayers are received at the parish, you will receive a phone call, making it possible for you to participate in this important prayer ministry.

Hospital Communion Ministry

With concern for your privacy, should you be admitted to St. Peter's Health, you will be invited to disclose your religious affiliation and your interest in having a member of Saint Mary Catholic Community contact you during your hospital stay. If you'd like to receive Communion from a Pastoral Care Minister or Father Cody Williams, it is important that you answer the questions that enable the hospital Chaplain to contact Saint Mary for you. The nurse completing your intake will ask if you'd like to visit with the Chaplain, Kim Pepper (a member of Our Lady of the Valley Parish), or disclose your religious affiliation and will then inquire if you'd like someone from your faith community to visit you. The Pastoral Care Ministry of Saint Mary Catholic Community would love to provide you with comfort during your hospital stay.

SMCC Celebrates the Season of Creation September 1 – October 4

“The Season of Creation is the annual Christian celebration to pray and respond together to the cry of Creation: the ecumenical family around the world unites to contemplate and care for our common home...This year, we will unite



around **the theme ‘Living Water’**,
with the symbol ‘immersion in Living Water’
inspired by Ezekiel 47:9 and 12.”
(Season of Creation 2026 – Celebration Guide)

In 1989, September 1st was proclaimed as a day of prayer for creation in the Orthodox church. It is the first day of their church year which begins with a commemoration of how God created the world. Subsequently, the World Council of Churches was instrumental in extending this sacred time from a day into a season. The **World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation** begins on the first day of September and ends on the Feast of Saint Francis of Assisi on October 4th. Throughout the month-long celebration, we come together in an annual, global, ecumenical celebration of prayer and action for our common home. In 2015, **Pope Francis honored the Catholic Church’s growing desire to celebrate and protect creation by making the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation and the Season of Creation an official part of the Catholic Church calendar.**

Pope Leo XIV is emphasizing the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation and the Season of Creation. In 2025 he **instituted a creation themed mass**. His Prayer of Intention for the month of September, in keeping with the 2026 theme of **Living Water**, is: **“Let us pray for a just and sustainable management of water, a vital resource, so that everyone may have equal access to it.”**

Saint Mary Catholic Community is celebrating the Season of Creation with a welcome and intercessory prayer and creation themed music during weekend masses, bulletin articles, the annual Saint Francis Peace Through Justice Ministry/Jubilee Garden/Care for Creation Ministry annual potluck, a Parish Diversity Celebration display, and a Blessing of the Animals for the Feast of Saint Francis. Heartfelt thanks to Deacon Michael, Father Cody, the music ministry and all members of parish staff and parish ministries contributing to this celebration.
