Prayer part 6

The Hail Mary

Unlike the Our Father, which is clearly found in Scripture, the Hail Mary is a product of tradition. The first part of the Hail Mary is found in Scripture. The first part – “Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with you” – is found in Luke 1 when the Archangel Gabriel comes to meet Mary and announce that she will give birth to the Messiah. The next part comes from Mary’s visit to Elizabeth when Elizabeth exclaims: “Blessed are you among women and blessed is the fruit of your womb.” Let’s take a moment to appreciate this introduction as taken from Scripture.

The first line begins the prayer. Just like the Our Father, we begin our prayers by knowing whom we are addressing as we begin the prayer. Most people hear these first few words and assume the prayer is addressed to Mary. This is not quite accurate. We are speaking to Mary and reflecting on what she has done to help bring us salvation but the prayer is actually addressed to God. The final line makes my point: “pray for us.” We are asking Mary to pray for us through this prayer. The prayer is actually addressed to God through Mary. The next part of the prayer focuses on the words that the Archangel Gabriel spoke to Mary. These words are mysterious. What does “full of grace” mean? What does “the Lord is with you” mean? These first few lines give us the context of both this prayer and the Rosary. We are reflecting on the events that God has done to bring us salvation. Mary being one of the key players. She was the one who was given a special grace to bear God’s son. Mary is the one who found favor with God. Mary had a special grace to have God with her.

The second part clarifies the beginning and draws us into a deeper mystery. By repeating the words that Elizabeth spoke to Mary, we are also both calling to mind the event and drawing close to this event. As Mary came to visit Elizabeth while Jesus was in her womb, so are we reminding ourselves and desiring for God to come and visit us and draw close to us. These two parts of Luke 1 paint a beautiful picture of the context of this prayer. Jesus came into the world to be with his people through Mary. So, we are reflecting on this moment and asking Jesus to draw close to us through this prayer and these events.

The first half of the prayer is rather old and draws upon tradition. Luke kept these stories in his Gospel to fill in the details for us so that we might come to know the origin of Jesus and his birth. The earliest Christians found these passages useful for their understanding of Jesus and would continue to reflect on them. We follow in their footsteps when we pray this prayer. We too are reflecting on the life of Jesus and Mary and allowing these events to impact our lives and draw us into the mystery of God. The Hail Mary, and in extension the Rosary, are prayers through which we reflect on Scripture and allow the events of Jesus’ life be made present to us.

The nurse completing your intake will ask if you'd like to visit with the Chaplain, Kim Pepper (a member of Our Lady of the Valley Parish), or disclose your religious affiliation and will then inquire if you'd like someone from your faith community to visit you. The Pastoral Care Ministry of Saint Mary Catholic Community would love to provide you with comfort during your hospital stay.

Please let the hospital staff know if a visit would be helpful for you.

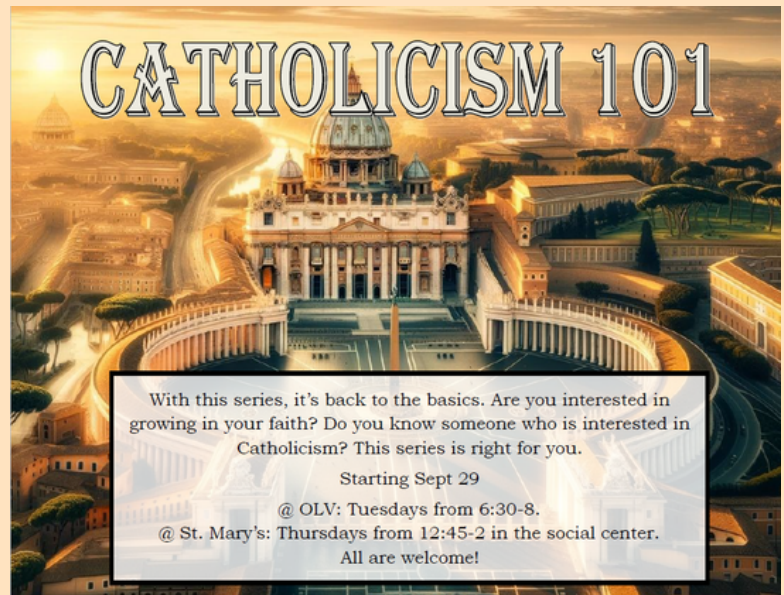

Some frequently asked questions:

What is an exact bid vs a proxy bid? An exact bid is the typical way people are used to placing a bid and is for the exact amount you place. You will get a confirmation of your bid by email/text. If you are outbid you will get another email/text letting you know. A proxy bid allows you to enter the maximum amount you're willing to spend with the goal of winning the item at the lowest possible price. The system will bid for you, up to your maximum proxy bid amount, as additional bids are entered on the item.

How can I collect the items I won? Items will be available for pick up at the church from 11:30-12:30 or in the office the following week.

How will I know if I win an item? Once the auction closes, you will receive an email for any items that you have won as well as the total amount owed. Invoices will be printed once the auction closes

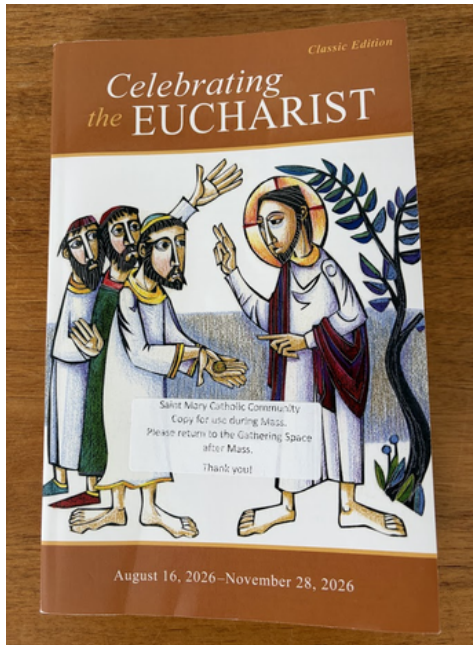
 Redecorating May Begin: October 30, 2026

Immigrants – Detention Centers – Let Us Pray

In the **Prayers of the Faithful** at St. Mary Catholic Community, we regularly pray for “**Our Country and All Who Call It Home.**” Implicitly, that intercession includes those people who have come here illegally – some on their own, some as part of a family, some as children. Among those are individuals who have established themselves as members of the community. They provide valuable employment, establish businesses and integrate themselves and their families into the fabric of society. However, because of their “illegal” status they are in danger of deportation, either back to their country of birth (which may put them in extreme danger) or some totally foreign country with which they have no ties, no language, basically nothing at all. They are often ripped away from families with children being separated from their parents or included in the arrest. Before deportation they are placed in “**detention centers**” with reportedly dreadful conditions. **Here are a few facts about those centers:**



There are over 400 active detention sites in the country, including jails and holding rooms. The Cascade County Jail is one in Montana with an average of 8 detainees as of Aug. 2026. (Recently two detainees from Bozeman were held at the Helena airport before being transferred to Great Falls.)

About 60,000 people are currently being held. Since 2025, 400,000 people have been booked into detention centers.

70% of current detainees have no criminal record.

On average, 226 children are detained in centers daily. *

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops issued the following statement which includes reference to the fact that detainees are often denied access to spiritual and pastoral care.

*“We are saddened by the state of contemporary debate and the vilification of immigrants. We are concerned about the conditions in detention centers and the lack of access to pastoral care. We lament that some immigrants in the United States have arbitrarily lost their legal status.” ***

Additionally, the USCCB action alerts encourage voters to contact their representatives to support a bill that would protect “Dreamers” and those with Temporary Protective Status.

May we pray that all immigrants, regardless of status, be given the human dignity to which they are entitled. And may we advocate insistently for change in the attitudes and treatment of immigrants – changes that reflect the kindness, inclusion and welcoming that Jesus taught.

Adopt-a-Highway

October 10, 2026 at 9:00 am

Saint Mary Catholic Community has adopted a two-mile stretch of US Highway 12 W. The next cleanup will be on October 10 followed by a picnic lunch a short distance from the cleanup area. Anyone age 10 and up can participate.

Please wear sturdy shoes, long pants and layer for changing weather conditions. Suggested items to bring with you are: sunscreen, bug spray, gloves, sunglasses, hat and a water bottle. Snacks and additional water bottles will be available during the cleanup.

Immediately following the cleanup, there will be a picnic lunch at the Ten Mile Picnic Area located approximately four miles from the cleanup area south on Rimini Road.

Soups, breads and drinks will be provided.

Bring a salad or dessert to share.

This is a great way to care for our community, share in fellowship with other parishioners, and spend some time in a beautiful area of God's creation.
